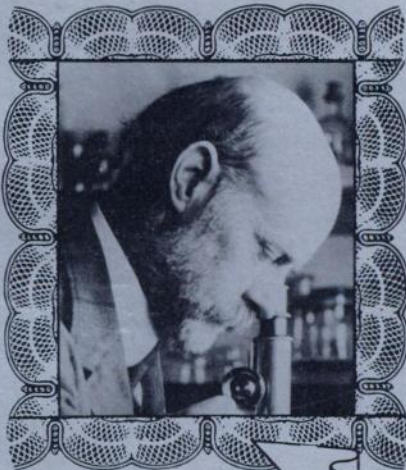

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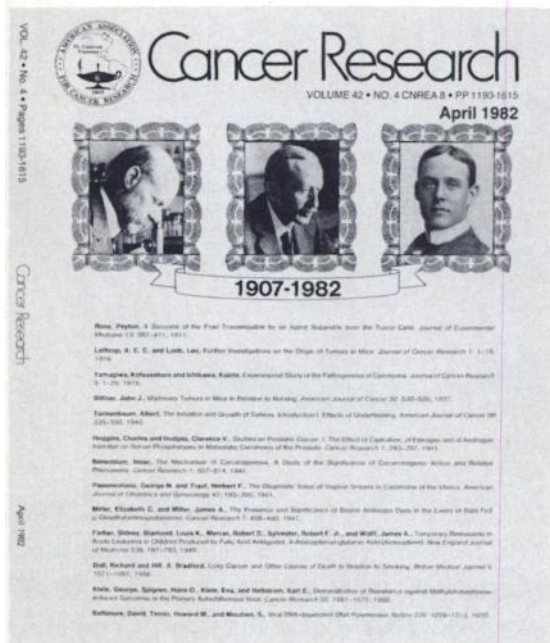
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COVER LEGEND



"By their fruits ye shall know them."

The American Association for Cancer Research (AACR) was born in Washington, D. C., on May 8, 1907. We are celebrating, in 1982, the 75th anniversary, the Diamond Jubilee, of the organization. The AACR has grown in membership, in its meetings, and in its prestige as a forum for cancer research. But its most important product is the scientific contributions of its members, and indeed of all cancer researchers, toward the eventual solution of the biological enigma called cancer, leading to the prevention and cure of this scourge.

During the past 75 years, some publications have been particularly noteworthy as contributions to the knowledge concerning neoplastic diseases. Such contributions have come from laboratories, from clinics, and from field observations around the world.

On this occasion of the Diamond Jubilee, our cover theme lists the titles of a dozen outstanding publications on cancer research.

The history of AACR is recorded in two publications: V. A. Triolo and I. L. Riegel. *The American Association for Cancer Research, 1907-1940. Cancer Research, 21: 137-167, 1961*; and H. J. Creech. *Historical Review of the AACR, Inc., 1941-1978. Cancer Research, 39: 1863-1890, 1979.*

J. Collins Warren, surgeon of Harvard University, Boston

James Ewing was selected first president of the AACR, with Frank B. Mallory as vice-president and Harvey R. Gaylord as secretary.
